Precision Radiation Therapy at St. Rita's Offers Targeted Treatment

LIMA (Oct. 27, 2014) St. Rita's Regional Cancer Center is now offering Stereotactic Body Radiation Therapy. SBRT is a very precise form of radiation therapy that can deliver higher doses of radiation in fewer treatment sessions. It's part of our mission to ensure all residents of West Central Ohio have access to advanced medical technology and quality care.

SBRT uses precision scanning technology to target tumors, then delivers a focused beam of radiation. It poses less risk to surrounding healthy tissue. Standard radiation therapy typically involves up to 35 treatments over seven weeks. SBRT delivers up to five treatments over two weeks. Stereotactic Body Radiation Therapy is particularly effective against small, well-defined tumors in the lung, liver or spine, in patients who are inoperable or high surgical risk.

"SBRT is an effective and less-invasive option for certain patients with lung tumors, especially if the patient has other medical conditions," said Sandra Herrington, PhD, M.D., Lead Radiation Oncologist for the SBRT Program at St. Rita's. "A patient with emphysema is likely to have the condition worsened with standard radiation therapy treatment, and those patients with cardiac problems would likely not be eligible for surgery."

Additionally, both the short term and long term outcomes are at least as good, or better, for patients having SBRT as compared to surgery for lung cancer.

"Stereotactic Body Radiation Therapy is certainly a wonderful treatment option for select patients with lung cancer, and it's now available right here at St. Rita's," Dr. Herrington said. "We've completed SBRT treatment for three patients so far, all with good results, and we are excited about having this state-of-the-art cancer treatment for our community, in a convenient and close-to-home setting."
